Brief History of IMMANUEL EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH


FREEPORT, ILLINOIS

February 23, 1877, the Rev. T. J. Grosse, Addison, Illinois, came to Freeport upon the request of the Northern Illinois Pastoral Conference to survey the field for the purpose of preaching the Gospel of Christ Jesus, and with the help of God to organize a truly Christian congregation. He had been furnished with the names of two men to contact. With difficulty he located these two men and explained his mission to them. These men endeavored to discourage him. However, with the help of God he continued in his efforts.

Rev. Grosse then met Mrs. John Schroeder who previously lived in Oak Park, Illinois. At first she thought this was Pastor Grosse's brother, who was Pastor of Harlem Lutheran Church. Pastor Grosse explained his mission to Mrs. Schroeder. With joy, she informed the Pastor that a number of Lutherans lived in Freeport and introduced him to the Elders of the Evangelical Church. The Pastor of the Evangelical Church had resigned and the Elders invited Pastor Grosse to preach in their church. Consent and permission were obtained from the resigned Pastor of the Evangelical Church and thus the first Lutheran Services were conducted in Freeport, Illinois, on February 25th, 1877.




March 18, 1877 and thereafter, Lutheran services were held every Sunday in the large auditorium of the public school in the third ward.

April 15, 1877 Pastor Grosse was requested to organize a Lutheran Congregation and he thereupon presented this group of believers with a constitution.

May 6, 1877 another meeting was held and the Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church, Unaltered Augsburg Confession, Freeport, Stephenson County, Illinois, was organized. The Constitution was adopted and signed by nineteen men. Pastor Grosse was requested to remain in Freeport. He accepted and thus became the first Pastor of our church.

May 20, 1877, Pentecost Sunday, the Congregation observed the celebration of the Lord's Supper in accordance with the words of institution.



FIRST CHURCH
Dedicated — 1877

September 2, 1877, the first church was dedicated on property secured at South Chicago Avenue and West Pleasant Street. This building was also to serve as a Christian day school and a teacher was engaged that fall. December 20, 1877 Pastor Grosse preached his farewell sermon on the basis of Acts 20:32 "And now brethren, I commend you to God, and to the Word of His Grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."

December 20, 1877 Candidate F. Behrens was installed and ordained as Pastor of Immanuel Congregation. This took place in the morning service. In 1881 Pastor Behrens accepted a call and departed from our congregation.




REV. F. BEHRENS 1877 - 1881

SECOND CHURCH Dedicated — 1886

In 1886 our second church was dedicated. The first church now became the school building. A basement was built high enough for a second class room. Rapidly the second church became too small and property was purchased at the corner of South Chicago Avenue and East Pleasant Street. In 1899, after eighteen years of faithful service, Pastor H. G. Schmidt accepted a call to Milwaukee, Wisconsin.




REV. A. C. LANDECK 1899 - 1914

December 1, 1900, our present, large and beautiful brick Church was dedicated. The cost of construction was approximately \$13,000.00.

In 1914, Pastor Landeck accepted a call to the Congregation at Pecatonica, Illinois.




OUR PRESENT CHURCH Dedicated — 1900

OUR SCHOOL
Erected in 1923

In 1923 it became apparent that a new school building was needed. Our present school building was then constructed at a cost of over \$70,000.00. It contains four large class rooms, a library, auditorium, bowling alleys, kitchen, recreation rooms, stage and motion picture facilities, complete hot water heating plant with stoker operation and rooms for various meetings.

In 1927 Pastor Seidel accepted a call to St. James Church, Chicago, Illinois

October 2, 1927 Rev. Schumacher accepted a call to Immanuel Congregation and was installed as Pastor. During his Pastorate the debts of the Congregation were eliminated and the property south of the Church building was purchased for use as a parsonage.

The previous parsonage near the school building was converted to a teacherage.


June 28, 1950 Pastor Schumacher accepted a call to Our Savior's Church at Bettendorf, Iowa.

October 8, 1950 Rev. F. E. Bartling was installed as Pastor of Immanuel Congregation and is our present pastor.




Our Present Pastor REV. F. E. BARTLING 1950 -

In 1951 the Congregation rebuilt and completely modernized the parsonage at 617 South Chicago Ävenue.




PARSONAGE
617 So. Chicago Ave.






Our first Teacherage in its present location at 510 South Chicago Avenue.
